
The following contains instructions to join a WebEx event hosted by the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA).

NOTE: The preferred audio connection to our event is via telephone conference and not the microphone and speakers on your computer. Further guidance relevant to the audio connection will be outlined below.

1. Navigate to the WebEx event link provided by the DCA entity (an example link is provided below for reference) via an internet browser.



2. The details of the event are presented on the left of the screen and the required information for you to complete is on the right.
NOTE: If there is a potential that you will participate in this event during a Public Comment period, you must identify yourself in a manner that the event Host can then identify your line and unmute it so the event participants can hear your public comment. The 'First name', 'Last name' and 'Email address' fields do not need to reflect your identity. The department will use the name or moniker you provide here to identify your communication line should you participate during public comment.





3. Click the 'Join Now' button.

NOTE: The event password will be entered automatically. If you alter the password by accident, close the browser and click the event link provided again.

4. If you do not have the WebEx applet installed for your browser, a new window may open, so make sure your pop-up blocker is disabled. You may see a window asking you to open or run new software. Click 'Run'.



Depending on your computer's settings, you may be blocked from running the necessary software. If this is the case, click 'Cancel' and return to the browser tab that looks like the window below. You can bypass the above process.



- 6. A dialog box will appear at the bottom of the page, click 'Run'.




The temporary software will run, and the meeting window will open.

7. Click the audio menu below the green 'Join Event' button.




8. When the audio menu appears click 'Call in'.






9. Click 'Join Event'. The audio conference call in information will be available after you join the Event.




If you join the meeting using your computer's microphone and audio, or you didn't connect audio at all, you can still set that up while you are in the meeting.

The 'Call In' information can be displayed by selecting 'Call in' then 'View'




You will then be presented the dial in information for you to call in from any phone.



### Participating During a Public Comment Period


At certain times during the event, the facilitator may call for public comment. If you would like to make a public comment, click on the 'Q and A' button near the bottom, center of your WebEx session.



This will bring up the 'Q and A' chat box.

NOTE: The 'Q and A' button will only be available when the event host opens it during a public comment period.





To request time to speak during a public comment period, make sure the 'Ask' menu is set to 'All panelists' and type 'I would like to make a public comment'.

Attendee lines will be unmuted in the order the requests were received, and you will be allowed to present public comment.

AB 5 (Gonzalez)	Worker status: employees and independent contractors	Codifies the requirements in the Dynamex case and clarify its application. The Dynamex decision would not apply (determination shall be governed by Borello) for services provided by a licensed esthetician, licensed electrologist, licensed manicurist, licensed barber, or licensed cosmetologist provided that the individual: sets their own rates, processes their own payments, is paid directly by clients, sets their own hours and has sole discretion to decide number of clients and which clients they provide services, has their own book of business and schedules their own appointments, and maintains their own business license for the services offered to clients. Also, if the individual is performing services at the location of the hiring entity, then the individual issues a Form 1099 to the salon or business owner from which they rent their business space. This subdivision shall become inoperative, with respect to licensed manicurists, on January 1, 2022. AB 193 (Patterson)	Professions and vocations	Requires DCA to conduct a review of all occupational licensing requirements and identify unnecessary licensing requirements. Requires each board to submit to DCA an assessment on the board's progress in implementing policies to facilitate licensure portability for active duty service members, veterans, and military spouses. DCA would then report to the Legislature. Removes shampooing and applying makeup on another person from practice of barbering and cosmetology but requires the unlicensed person to disclose verbally or in writing prior to performing service that they are not licensed. AB 496 (Low)	Business and professions	Replaces gendered terms with non-gendered terms. Changes the Assembly report requirement for DCA report. Provides the appointing authority power to remove a board member from office for continued neglect of duties, incompetence, or unprofessional or dishonorable conduct. Requires the Board to meet at least twice a calendar year once in northern California and once in southern California. 		Legislature during the 2019 calendar year that takes effect on or before January 1, 2020, and that amends, amends and renumbers, adds, repeals and adds, or repeals a section of law that is amended by this act, shall prevail over this act, whether that act is enacted prior to, or subsequent to, the enactment of this act.			
AB 817 (Kiley)	Mobile units	Revises the definition of mobile unit to mean a self-contained, self-supporting, enclosed movable unit in which any activity licensed under this chapter is practiced. Removes the requirements that the above-described applications include copies of certain local licenses or permits and proof of compliance with applicable city, county, and state plumbing, electrical, and fire laws, and would, instead, require those applications to include a signed acknowledgment under penalty of perjury that they are in compliance with all applicable city and county requirements, including plumbing, electrical, and fire laws. Removes the requirement that the application for a state license include proof of purchase or lease of the shop equipment. Removes the geographical boundaries limitations on the license to operate a mobile unit. AB 1607 (Boerner Horvath)	Gender discrimination: notification	Requires a city, county, or city and county that issues local business licenses to provide written notification of the above provisions to the licensee at the time the business license is issued or renewed in English, Spanish, Chinese, Tagalog, Vietnamese, and Korean commencing January 1, 2021. The bill would authorize a city, county, or city and county to increase the fee for a business license to cover the reasonable cost of providing the notice. Commencing October 1, 2020, DCA shall provide a pamphlet in English, Spanish, Chinese, Tagalog, Vietnamese, and Korean to explain that the business is prohibited from charging different prices for similar services based on the customer's gender. AB 2113 (Low)	Refugees, asylees, and special immigrant visa holders: initial licensure process	Requires DCA boards to expedite and assist the initial licensure process for an applicant who supplies satisfactory evidence that they are a refugee, have been granted asylum, or have a special immigrant visa, as specified. The bill would authorize programs to adopt regulations necessary to administer these provisions.	N/A	Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 186, Statutes of 2020.	DCA will assist with implementation of new forms and application language.
AB 2465 (Gonzalez)	Worker status: independent contractors: barbering and cosmetology	Requires the Board to adopt (by July 1, 2022) regulations for the development of a booth renter permit and a biennial fee (not to exceed \$50) for a licensed esthetician, electrologist, manicurist, barber, or cosmetologist. The booth renter permit shall become operative 6 months after the effective date of regulations adopted by the Board. SB 188 (Mitchell)	Discrimination: hairstyles	Provides that the definition of race regarding discrimination for the workplace and educational institutions also include traits historically associated with race, including, but not limited to, hair texture and protective hairstyles. SB 238 (Grove)	Worker status: factors for determination of employee status	Allows for an analysis of whether a worker is economically dependent upon the hiring entity to determine whether that worker is an employee. This analysis shall be based upon the economic reality of the worker's relationship with the hiring entity by considering only the following six factors:  (a) The nature and degree of control by the principal.  (b) The worker's opportunities for profit and loss.  (c) The amount of the worker's investment in facilities and equipment.  (d) The permanency of the relationship.  (e) The required skill necessary for success.  (f) The extent to which the services rendered are an integral part of the principal's business.	WATCH	Failed 04/24/2019.	N/A
SB 806 (Grove)	Worker status: employees: independent contractors	Repeals the "ABC" (Dynamex) test and establishes a new test for governing the relationship of employer and employees. A person providing labor or services for payment is considered an employee rather than an independent contractor unless the hiring entity demonstrates that the person is: 1) free from control and direction AND either that 2) the person performs work outside the usual course of the hiring entity's business, or the work performed is outside the place of business, or the worker is responsible for the costs of the place of business where the work is performed, OR 3) the person is customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, or business of the same nature as that involved in the work performed.
